# Congratulations on your recent appointment as a Senior Special Assistant to the President Sir. Kindly give us a reflection of your life from your days as a GCL student to the Fela today as a Senior Special Assistant to the President?

Thank you so much. The appointment as the Senior Special Assistant to the President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria is a privilege I do not take lightly at all. Upon graduation, I was privileged to work as a Youth corp member in one of Nigeria's biggest tech companies - SystemSpecs Limited. My time in SystemSpecs was another milestone in my life. My entrepreneurial skills were groomed there and I grew to become a Senior Manager of International Sales. I later resigned after 8 years to start my company (MediaVision) which is still running till now even though I left it over 5 years ago to work with the Lagos State Government.. And to the GCL students reading this and thinking about what awaits him in the future, what skills would you advise him to equip himself with?

Soft skills. You must understand that the world places more value



on soft skills like communication, critical thinking, problem solving, emotional intelligence etc.

So they must be deliberate about acquiring and developing those skills. Technology is also a big thing now, you must be tech savvy to be relevant and get ahead in this time and age.

That experience gave me all the confidence I needed to overcome any face-to-face job interview that I took part in later on in life, till date. In the end, before the entire school, along with other successful prefects, I was adorned with the unique GCL badge as the Health Prefect 2 and I watched gleefully as the students cheered us on as the latest "Ambassadors" of the Great GCL! I eventually went on to occupy several other leadership positions spanning from my University days, to my NYSC year and down to my secular job while impacting positively on the lives of the people I lead.

6. Control of Power: Back in my GCL days, there was always this endless insidious rivalry between SS2 and SS3 students. While the SS3 students still feel they are the most senior set and should be respected accordingly, the SS2 students on the other hand feel they are the latest sheriffs in town as the SS3 students only have a few months to graduate and so why can't they start wielding their powers already. It happened one day that a certain NGO visited our school to sensitize all senior secondary students on HIV/AIDS. That same day, most of the other prefects have gone out to represent the School in a spelling competition leaving behind myself a few other prefects. The onus was now on me especially to deliver as the Health Prefect of the School. After the quiz, the winners were announced starting from the 3rd position which happens to be an SS2 student. The 2nd position was announced and it was yet another SS2 student and before long, the hall was in great uproar as the SS2 students present started bragging that they will claim all the prizes because

the SS3 students are not as intelligent as they were. Finally, the 1st position was announced and you just can't imagine the heavy sigh of relief that heaved as I walked up majestically towards the podium to receive my prize. It was an impeccable vindication! The experience taught me that if you are a leader, always try to know more than your subjects or subordinates. Be a step or more ahead of them, for the moment they know even as much as you do, then you stand a risk of losing full control of your authority and powers.

Sweet reminiscence flowed through my mind as I reflected on the fiercely contested Principal Cup, the Induction Ceremonies of various Social Clubs and the fun that went along with it, the drama in the examination hall during our WAEC and NECO exams and the bitter-sweet feelings of our most memorable Valedictory Service, where we bade farewell to our mates and the College that have shaped us formidably to face the challenges that lies ahead of us. Feelings of nostalgia enveloped me as I thought all these friends and memories will gradually attenuate with the passage of time.

Eureka! That was not to be as 17 years after graduating from GCL, most of us are still in active contact, not just with our classmates but a strong network of GCL Old Boys (GCL OBA) Community that cuts across several continents of the world. All thanks to digital technology – we evolved!
